
What happened in 2020?

PARKS COUNCIL MEMBER CLUBS



Member clubs are foundational partners in the Parks System. Volunteers from these clubs host events, maintain, enhance and develop recreational facilities that can be enjoyed by residents and visitors.

How to get through a pandemic? That's what many people were asking during the year, and for many area residents and visitors, outdoor recreational assets were a refuge for some fun and normalcy. Some member clubs were able to facilitate safe, social distanced ways to recreate...some had a slightly more difficult time. We asked Club Directors to describe what 2020 was like for their club with one word...

Brazeau ATV Club "Frusturating"

Maintenance permits were not accessible during 2020 so little work was able to be done on the trail system

Brazeau Bowbenders Archery Club "Challenging"

The Club was able to hold one shoot during restrictions, however overall memberships declined

Drayton Valley Horse Club "Adaptive"

Club activites had to be modified to meet restrictions, but trails were utilized

Drayton Valley Paddling Club "Calm"

Between the weather and the pandemic, paddlers frequently participated in self directed adventures

Evergreen Shooting Club "Chagrined"

Access or waiting to use the range was never something members had to think about until the pandemic

West Central River Boat Association "Complicated"

Between Covid-19 restrictions and Mother Nature's gravel deposits in front of the existing boat launch, river access was a challenge

Drayton Valley Rotary Club "Connection"

Efforts were continually made for connection with each other and the community

Pembina Nordic Ski Club "Discover"

Being able to facilitate skiing, hiking, biking and disc golf, the club was utilized by many first time users

PARKS DAY 2020







Typically, Parks Day is a huge celebration of all things outdoors with the addition of games, music, entertainment, club hosted activities, and a free community barbecue. That was a no-go in 2020, so we developed "Summer Adventure in a Box" to honour Parks Day. One hundred families were able to register and "drive-thru" to pick up a box containing pond dipping supplies, a bug hunting kit, an activity book, and a three-man tent. We included items that would encourage folks to get outside for an awesome adventure!

COMMUNITY EVENTS

How do you hold community events when you can't gather as a community?

- ✓ Go outside so you can socially distance
- ✓ Create self-directed activities
- ✓ Have activities open for multiple hours, or even days
- ✓ Stay with your family or cohort

This process seemed to work for our "Community Pumpkin Walk" we hosted with Aim for Success and our "Critter Christmas Tree" in partnership with DV Family and Community Support Services. Both events were held on the Rotary Pembina Nordic Community Trail South. We had such positive community responses, they are soon to become annual events!





ACTION FOR ENERGY PROJECT

In 2019, Eagle Point-Blue Rapids Parks Council was awarded a grant by the Community Environmental Action Program to create a new Environmental Education program called Action for Energy. The aim of Action for Energy was to introduce our participants to alternate energy forms and energy efficient construction while exploring Climate Literacy and encouraging participants to improve their own energy consumption habits. We have created a program which includes a movie, a board game, classroom visits and remote learning.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

By mid 2019, we successfully facilitated several Action for Energy group experiences in partnership with Drayton Valley Centre for Water Intelligence. This modified version included a presentation on Climate Literacy, a tour of the water treatment facility's energy saving features, and construction of small solar powered pizza box ovens with participants aged 12 to 14. As a followup activity, participants did 12 challenges to reduce their personal energy use at home and in the classroom. We collected and analyzed their responses to compute the reductions in greenhouse gas emissions.



CLASSROOM VISITS

In the fall of 2020, we booked the Action for Energy program with more classes, but due to COVID restrictions, we brought Circuit Meter Technology to their classroom. The students were able to log in to the Outdoor Education Centre's Circuit Meter Dashboard and see in real time the Outdoor Education Centre's energy use (heating system, lighting, etc). They could also observe the solar panel power generation in real time, study the historical data, and test out several appliances to compare their energy usage, all from the classroom and their own chrome books!



Creating an online Action for Energy learning resource was important, so we produced "Action for Energy - The Movie." We used local students as actors and a videographer to create this 30 minute online teaching resource. We plan to launch the premiere in autumn 2021 before sharing it with the teaching industry. The movie will include a lesson plan and the 12 challenges followup activity.





A BOARD GAME

We developed "Action for Energy - The Board Game," which measures 12' x 16.' The game is a hybrid spin on Snakes and Ladders and Trivial Pursuit with a Climate Literacy theme. When the game board is laid out on the floor of a school galleria, it is a magnet for students! The game has been used by several classrooms with great responses from teachers and students. We've also developed a table top version of this game which we lend out to groups.


